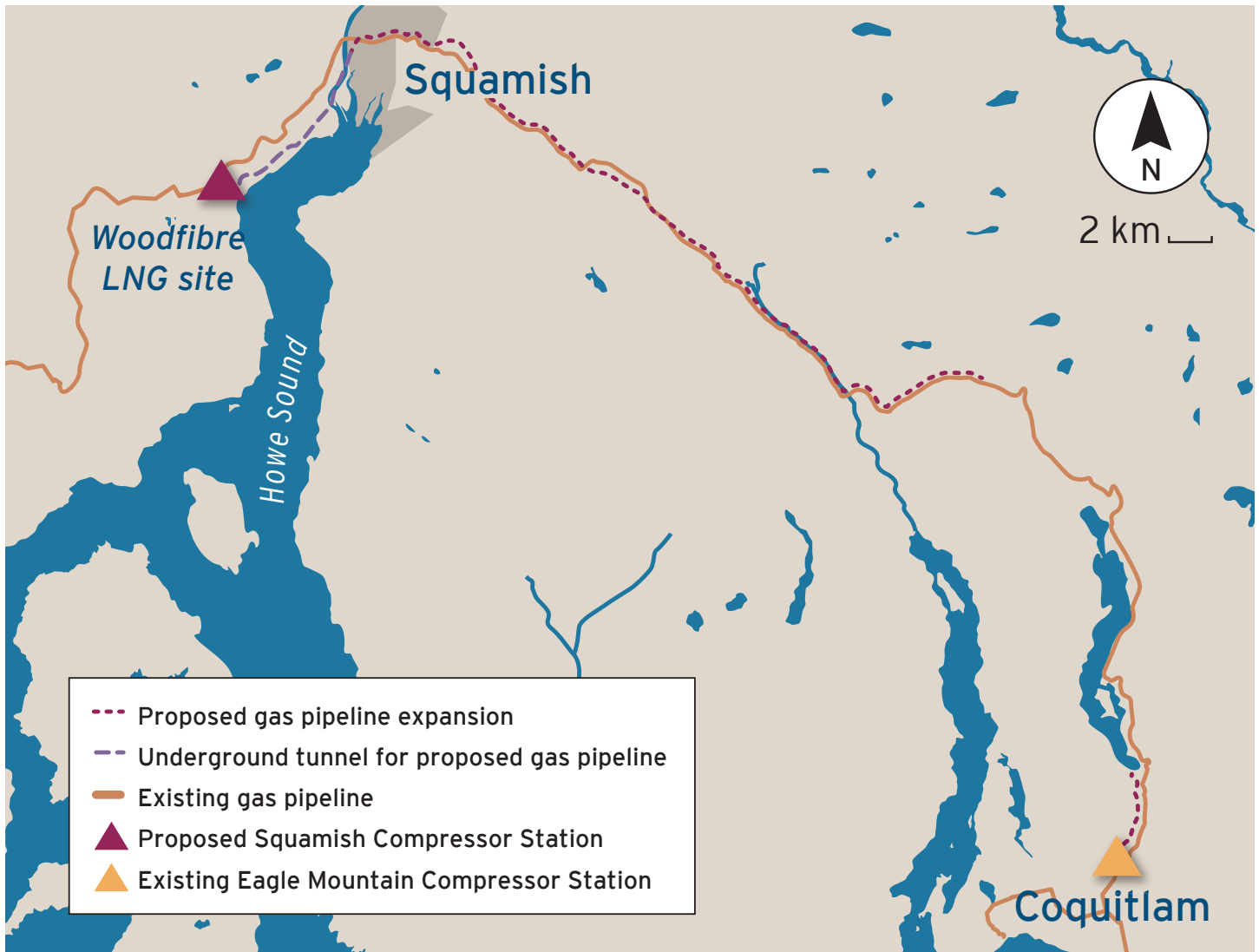


# Project overview

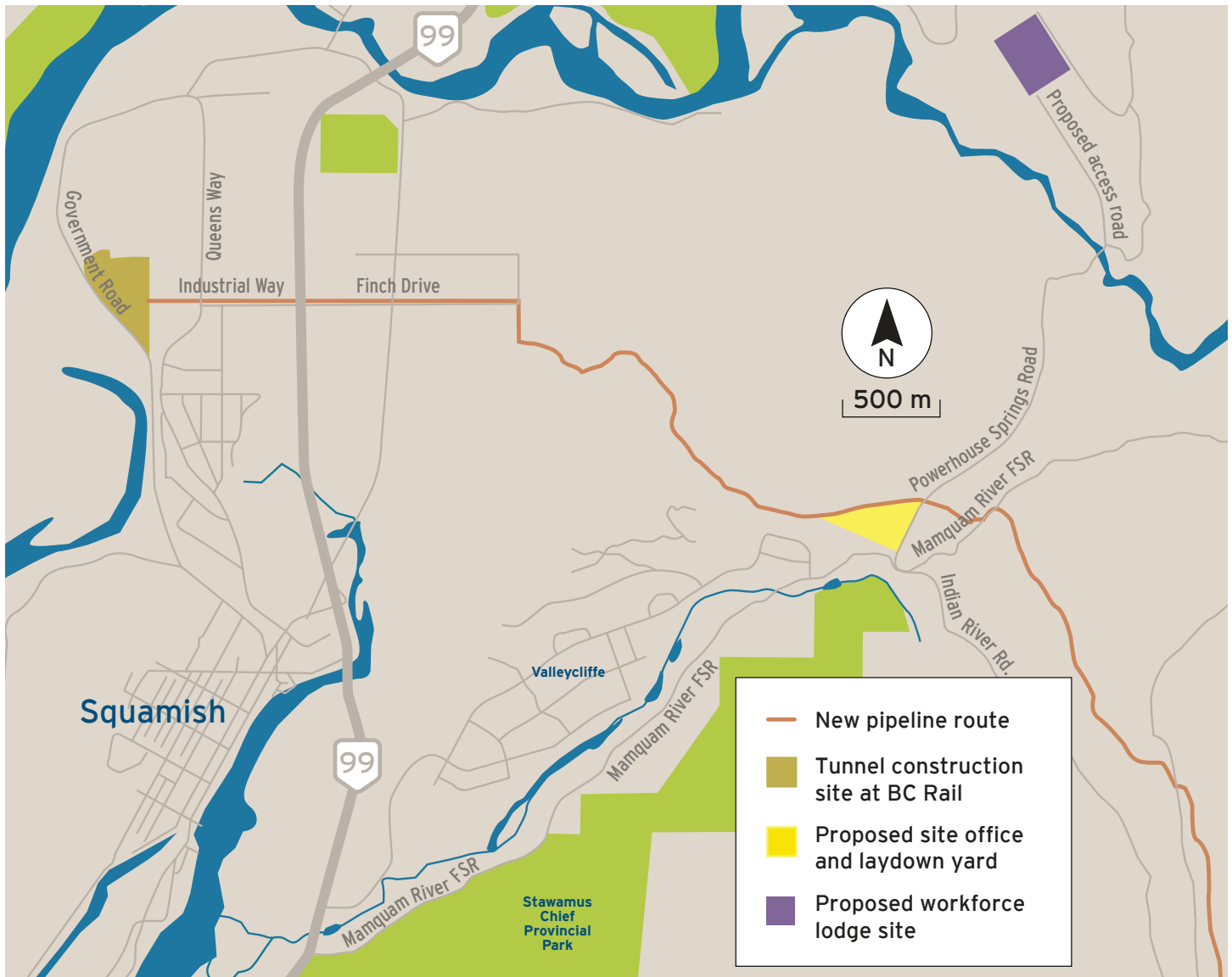
The Eagle Mountain - Woodfibre Gas Pipeline project will expand a portion of our existing Vancouver Island gas transmission system. The project involves adding approximately 50 kilometres of new 24-inch pipeline between Coquitlam and the Woodfibre LNG site in Squamish, as well as building supporting facilities.



The project was approved in 2016 by the BC Environmental Assessment Office and Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation). FortisBC has been engaging with Indigenous communities, and the Squamish and Coquitlam communities on the project since 2013. This engagement will continue ahead of and during construction.

FortisBC is currently seeking two amendments to its existing approvals; to increase the size of the workforce lodge to seven hectares; and to re-route approximately two kilometres of pipeline within the Indian River Valley.

We anticipate construction to take place between 2023 and 2026.



## Work within the District of Squamish will include:

- installing approximately six kilometres of new gas pipeline between the Mamquam River Forest Service Road and the BC Rail industrial site;
- building a nine-kilometre tunnel for the gas line system between the BC Rail industrial site and the Woodfibre LNG site to avoid impacting the Squamish Estuary;
- building a new compressor station at the Woodfibre LNG site; and
- a temporary workforce lodge, and temporary site office and laydown yard.
